



How much do you really know about your community college?

students

Since it opened in 1946, Westchester Community College has enrolled more than 343,000 students.

Approximately 38,500 students have completed their studies in a certificate or degree program.

Of the 2005 graduates who reported continuing their education after graduation, 35.9% attended a four-year college located in Westchester County, 22.1% attended college in New York State outside the County, and 4.6% attended college out of state. The remainder could not be determined.

In fall 2005, the average age of a Westchester Community College student was 27.5. The average age of part-time students was 32.7; of full-time students, 21.7 years.

Women comprise 49% of full-time students. Sixty-one percent of part-time students are women. All in all, women made up 56% of the credit student body in spring 2006.

The College serves a diverse student body:

- more than 3,000 adults in Mainstream, The Institute for Mature Adults
- approximately 5,000 minority students (44% of the credit student body – spring 2006)
- over 1,100 students with disabilities 2005-06
- lower socio-economic students
- over 4,000 students attending ESL classes
- several students with Ph.D. degrees!

programs

Westchester Community College programs are designed to meet community employment needs. Over 300 representatives of local employers and organizations sit on 30 advisory committees to keep our curricula current.

We offer more than 50 associate degree and certificate programs, grouped into five general areas: Liberal Arts and Sciences, Business Programs, Public Service Occupations, Engineering and Computer Technologies, and Health Sciences.

Business and industry often ask the college to design seminars or short courses to meet their needs. Recent corporate programs include Computer Assisted Drawing & Design, Microsoft Office Suite, Business Writing, ESL, and Management and Leadership Training.

Hundreds of non-credit continuing education courses are offered at the college.

Distance learning via the web is also available.

Numerous employers as well as transfer colleges have expressed satisfaction with the education Westchester Community College students receive.

faculty and instruction

Our faculty members are among the most capable teachers in the nation. Many publish and do research, although not required to do so.

Instruction at the college is innovative, ranging from traditional classrooms and Smartroom-equipped classrooms to computer enhanced hybrid courses and online instruction.

The college sponsors a number of appearances by prominent individuals to enrich instruction (usually available free-of-charge to the public). Among these speakers have been Margaret Atwood, Gwendolyn Brooks, Nien Cheng, Jill Ker Conway, Alistair Cooke, James Dickey, E.L. Doctorow, Katherine Graham, Gish Jen, Robert Kennedy Jr., Dr. Henry Kissinger, Pulitzer winner Yusef Komunyakaa, Pulitzer winner Philip Levine, Robert MacNeil, Joyce Carol Oates, Arthur Schlesinger Jr., Gay Talese, Stuart Udall, Judith Viorst, and Ben J. Wattenberg.

Westchester Community College offers its students and the community an array of culturally entertaining, enriching and affordable programs. These include unique series such as Retro Renaissance, Legends and Legacies, Mozart Marathon, New World Voyager Legends and Dance Days, featuring the finest of today's professional artists/performers.

Free daytime lecture series, such as Poets and Writers, treat the public and college community to appearances by such luminaries as Nobel winners Seamus Heaney and Derek Walcott.

The college's student drama troupe, Theater Connection, and modern dance company, Danceworks, present public performances.

Six exhibits of the works of professional artists in many different media are featured in the Fine Arts Gallery each year.

The college's New World Voyager Series focuses on culturally diverse arts and artists, such as the Carlota Santana Spanish Dance Company, Boys Choir of Harlem, Chinese Parade of Acrobats and Dancers, and the National Black Touring Circuit or "stars of tomorrow," and "new fusion art forms" including the internationally-acclaimed improvisation troupe, Second City.

The summer cultural arts series has featured a variety of performing arts, including the Harlem Blues and Jazz Band, a cabaret musical theater revue, and a New Orleans Jazz Mardi Gras, a Duke Ellington Tribute, as well as Victorian and Shakespearean Theater Festivals.

facilities

In addition to 13 buildings on a beautiful, 218-acre campus, Westchester Community College also has twelve extension sites throughout the County in Mahopac, Shrub Oak, Ossining, Yonkers (E.O.C., Roosevelt High School, Cross County), New Rochelle, Mount Vernon, Tuckahoe, and Port Chester, and the Westchester Art Workshops in White Plains and Peekskill, and has offered classes at 202 locations around the county since 1971.

Facilities include a pool, tennis courts, athletic fields, a 400-seat theater, a 48-station auto-tutorial center, 18 science laboratories, more than 2,100 computers and more than 55 computer teaching labs, and a state-of-the-art library and learning resource center.

Throughout the main campus, more than 840 personal computers are located in various labs for student use. An additional 395 personal computers are located in our extension sites for student use. All are Windows XP computers running Microsoft Office 2003 and more than 350 additional software titles. In summer 2006 ten Smart Technology Presenter stations, 20 wireless laptop labs for business, and a new CAD lab will be added.

The main campus in Valhalla is centrally located and accessible by public transportation.

Child care is provided by the Virginia Marx Children's Center for children of students, faculty, staff, and Westchester County employees.

Our library and other facilities are open to the Westchester public as well as students. Last year, nearly 330,000 people used college facilities for festivals, concerts, day camp, conferences, workshops, and competitions.

finances

In 2004-05 needy students received \$13,563, 721 in financial assistance.

Since its incorporation in 1969, the Westchester Community College Foundation has awarded more than \$7 million in scholarships and grants to more than 8,500 students.

The Westchester Community College Foundation ranks among the Top 10 community colleges in the nation in amount of funds raised. During the 2004-2005 academic year, the Foundation raised \$5.1 million, increased the scholarship endowment to \$9.1 million, and awarded \$859,000 to nearly 675 students.

The college attracts numerous grants — more than \$137 million since 1979 — thereby saving taxpayer money. During this same period almost \$110 million in student aid was awarded.

Westchester Community College annually spends \$8,215 to educate each full-time student (2003-2004). This expense is one of the lowest among colleges in the state despite Westchester being a high-cost-of-living area. Since the college keeps expenses down, our tuition (\$3,150 annually) cost less.

Upon graduation, most students in career programs live, work, and pay taxes in Westchester County: 50.0% of 2005 graduates reported being employed in the County. Another 18.8% were employed outside the county, but in New York State.

By attracting students to study here, the college saves the County chargeback expenditures, and keeps money in the County.

An Economic Impact Study conducted by Illinois State University estimated the financial impact of Westchester Community College at more than \$150 million annually in income generated and \$21 million in direct investments.

Jobs created by the college stimulate growth, which allows for ongoing expansion of Westchester's economic base.

approximately 38,500 students have completed their studies in a degree or certificate program at Westchester Community College and are productively employed, most in Westchester County.

The college's student body is **diversity in action:** 43.7 percent minority population, plus more than 3,000 enrollees in Mainstream, The Institute for Mature Adults at Westchester Community College, and more than 4,000 from 95 countries in our English as a Second Language classes.

Credit courses and the entire Computer
Programming certificate are now available
on the Internet.

Visiting lecturers have included Pulitzer and Nobel Prize winners and internationally-known celebrities, including E.L. Doctorow, Brendan Gill, Doris Kearns Goodwin, Dick Gregory, Dr. Henry Kissinger, Joyce Carol Oates, and William Kennedy.

Our **SMART ARTS** cultural series has included appearances by the Alvin Ailey Repertory Ensemble, Nobel laureates Seamus Heaney and Derek Walcott, our own dance and chamber music groups, MOMIX, Pilobolus, Moscow Boys Choir, St. Petersburg State Ice Ballet, Kahurangi New Zealand Maori Dance Theatre, and the Cab Calloway Orchestra.

nearly 325,500 westchester residents use their community college facility each year for events such as performances of the Martha Graham Dance Workshop.

tuition at Westchester Community College remains the lowest in the county (\$140/credit). The cost-per-student is among the lowest in the state, despite the fact that Westchester is a high-cost-of-living area.

The college's **professional development center** has provided
employee training programs for more than 100
regional businesses, including Belmay, Dolce
International, Regeneron Pharmaceuticals,
Lafarge North America, Kawasaki Rail Car and
Northern Westchester Hospital.

The economy of westchester county realizes a return of \$1.64 for every college budget dollar spent.

Westchester Community College offers more than 50 associate degree and certificate programs, in addition to 100's of continuing education courses. The college enrolled more than 32,055 **students** in the 2005-2006 academic year of which 18,039 students are taking courses for credit and another 14,016 non-credit.












Demographic Profile of 2005 Graduates



Using the guidelines set forth by the federal *Student Right to Know Act*, the completion rate for first-time, full-time students enrolled initially at Westchester Community College in Fall 2002 in a degree program who graduated within 3 years or transferred to a 4-year college is <u>414</u> out of <u>1,493</u> or 27.7%.

This is not the complete picture, however. Our studies show that many students take longer than three years to complete a degree. For example, of the first-time, full-time students who began in Fall 2002, 292 or 19.6% were still enrolled in Fall 2005. If these students are included, a total of 706 students or 47.3% have or are experiencing *student success* at WCC.
