

ACHIEVEMENTS FOR 2013-2014

- Westchester Community College ranks among the 30 community colleges in the SUNY system: fourth in total credit FTE's for fall 2013, and first in non-credit enrollments. We had a Fall, 2013 headcount of 13,781 in credit classes, and 13,903 annual in non-credit courses.
- The College's physical plant consists of 218 acres which includes 21 buildings, approximately 25 acres of parking lots and approximately 22.7 acres of athletic fields. All our public facilities are handicapped accessible, and we continually seek improvements through our capital projects planning and implementation.
- In addition to the Valhalla campus the College has 30 off-campus sites offering courses to both credit and non-credit students. Since 1970, the College has offered classes in over 39 public schools from Yorktown to Yonkers, approximately 110 organizations in the For Profit, Not-for-Profit and Government Sectors, and 53 civic associations from the American Red Cross to the Yorktown Chamber of Commerce, in over 18 public libraries from Armonk to Yonkers, 26 hospitals, and 25 senior centers and senior living facilities. Accessibility is our watchword.
- Diversity of the student body: Over 52% of the total credit student body is female, and over 56% are minority and Hispanic. In Fall 2013, students enrolled at WCC were from 41 other countries.
- The Division of Continuing Education and Community Services is now known as the Division of Continuing Education and Workforce Development, to better reflect our commitment to offering additional programs and services to directly benefit the local workforce needs.
- Westchester Community College has new and updated Transfer Agreements as of 2013-2014 with the following: College of New Rochelle, Excelsior College, and Fashion Institute of technology, Marymount Manhattan College, Pace University, and Purchase College.

- Of the 2012 graduates responding to the annual graduate survey, 57.8% of the respondents were employed either full-time (65.2%) or part time (34.8%). Of those employed, 63.3% were employed in Westchester County and another 26.7% in New York State, but outside the County. They work for virtually all major corporations, small businesses, government, hospitals, etc. in the County.
- The average full time salary earned by respondents, six months after graduation from the College is approximately \$37,499. The median salary is \$30,000.
- Number of programs of study at the College: 46 Degree programs granting an Associate Degree and 21 Certificate Programs.
- The public uses the College facilities for more than just educational courses. Last year over 405,000 individuals used the facilities for meetings including the NYS Troopers “Recruitment Tutorial”, the BOCES “Young Authors Conference”, meetings of the Westchester AYSO Soccer, Ossining High School Regents Exam Testing, Environmental Seminars sponsored by the Westchester Chemical Society, The Huaxia: Chinese New Year Educational Presentation, Westchester County Department of Health’s many provider-training workshops, Men’s Basketball Region Playoffs, the Association of Retarded Citizens Theater Program, American Red Cross Association’s “Lifeguard Training”, The Theodore Young Community Center Day Camp, The Tappan Zee Health Management Presentation, The Lanzia Foundation’s “Female Veterans Seminar”, The Successful Learning Center Presentation, meetings of the Westchester Photographic Society, the New York State “United Teacher’s Conference”, the “Women’s Empowerment Presentation”, the ACE Leadership Seminar “A Council on Education”, the Hudson Valley Blood Services Fall/Spring/Summer Blood Drives, the American Heart Association’s “Basic CPR Training”, the “NYS Media Arts Festival for High School Students”, the White Plains Recreation Department’s soccer practices and games, as a polling site for the Town of Greenburgh Elections, Westchester AARP’s “Tax-Aide Training”, the 3rd Annual Westchester Community College Student Film Festival, the “Westchester County Football Officials Association Conference”, the Empanada Festival, the Ecuadorian Civic Association Soccer League, The Westchester County Association’s “World Trade Council Program”, Congresswoman Lowey’s “4th Annual Financial Aid Forum”, seminars sponsored by the Rockland Economic Development Center, the WCC Math Club and WCC Chapter of Omega (Computer Science) Conference, Westchester Family Services Planning Seminars and Training for Female Veterans.
- Harold L. Drimmer Library is the focal point for the information and research needs of students, faculty, staff and administrators, and is open to the general Westchester County community. The library’s resources and services range from media, to print and electronic books, subscription databases that include full-text newspaper and magazine articles to virtual reference services and online course materials. Due to our resource-sharing partnerships with SUNY and WALDO, we are able to provide extensive interlibrary loan services. Users can also search for resources in the Westchester County and the New York Public Library System.
- In September 2013, Academic Affairs welcomed eight new full-time faculty in the following disciplines: Chemistry, Dance, English, Human Services, Mathematics, Psychology, and Veterinary Medicine.

- Academic Affairs and Continuing education collaborated to initiate a pre-health sciences pathway focused on establishing credit and non-credit cross-walks in Health Sciences programs, and providing targeted Health Sciences advisement to students.
- Academic Affairs approved a new General Education core that will aid students in timely degree completion and transfer.
- Faculty participated in a grant funded (by Con Edison) to increase enrollment by recruiting and retaining 30 new students to “Bright Futures” programs (environmental science, engineering, and energy systems programs) and introducing up to 400 students to energy industry careers by September 2014.
- Our faculty from many departments participated in outreach activities across the County. The participation included judging at the Tri-County Science Fair at White Plains High School, hosting tables at Engineering Expo and at our Open Houses, welcoming high school students at the annual Math and Computer Science on-campus “Mathfest.”
- The Food Service Administration co-sponsored a conference on March 29 with the Westchester Rockland Dietetic Association: Five Farmers Meet You at the Table: A Conversation on Sustainable Food Systems.
- Since its founding in 1969, Westchester Community College Foundation has raised funds to meet student and campus needs. The Foundation’s primary objective is to provide scholarship support for students, and for the past seven years in a row has distributed scholarships to over 1000 students. The Foundation moved the scholarship application process online, which resulted in a doubling of scholarship applications.
- The Westchester Community College Foundation has revitalized the Alumni Association, which is now in full swing with more than 1,200 members participating in its online community and other events. These events include a Financial Education Day during which hundreds of alumni, students and members of the community attended financial literacy workshops.
- The growing reputation of the college as a center for immigrant education led to a \$300,000 challenge grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities to establish the Westchester Community College Humanities Institute. This recognition extends the vision of the Gateway Center to other academic programs on campus.
- The Westchester Community College Foundation again attracted approximately 1,500 members of the community to its events including Celebrity Salons and the recent President’s Forum.
- The Division of Student Affairs is committed to providing services and programs that promote the college’s mission and academic goals. The Division has assisted students in developing educational and career plans that align with their interests, goals and abilities while empowering them to take an active role in their education and assume personal responsibility and accountability.
- The Career Center has been a participant in The Westchester Association, Recruit Westchester Program.
- WCC’s Phi Theta Kappa, a national honor society, was the recipient of three national recognition awards. Was recognized as one of the top 100 Chapters overall. There are over 1300 chapters.
- The Registrar’s Office implemented an online transcript request procedure and also automated the graduation application process.
- The Registrar’s Office introduced a new attendance recording process for Faculty.

- The Student Support Services Department completed a New Holistic Divisional Assessment Plan and developed a new transfer workshop to better prepare international transfer students in completing their education.
- The Office of Disabilities provided accommodations and related services to over 1000 students with disabilities.
- The Department of Student Development developed and presented “Transition from High School to College workshop” as an outreach to prospective WCC students and their families.
- The Office of Disabilities provided Specialized Counseling and Accommodations to blind, deaf, hard of hearing and students on the Autism spectrum to maximize their potential.
- The Office of Admissions continued with Outreach Efforts to community based organizations, veteran agencies and added high schools to their target list on data collected.
- The Admissions Office has partnered with Yonkers Partners in Education which assists Yonkers students in the college admissions process.
- The Office of Admissions collaborated with IT in the Implementation of an Online Application.
- The Office of Admissions collaborated with the Publications Office to create a new College Viewbook.
- The Office of Admissions collaborated with the WCC Foundation to host a HS Counselor Information Summit/Luncheon.
- The Office of Admissions collaborated with feeder High Schools to create a smooth transition in the Admissions/Enrollment process including Registration Days on campus.
- The College’s Chapter of Phi Theta Kappa, the national two-year college honor society, was named Distinguished Chapter and received recognition for Distinguished Theme Award for Honors in Action and Distinguished Honors in Action Project from Phi Theta Kappa International.
- Transfer Office continues to work with 4 year institutions on refreshing and creating articulation agreements; instant admits (on-site admission); weekly live chat through MEEBO; workshop series for both day and evening students; Fall Transfer Day.
- AoS (Accent on Students – those with less than a 2.0 cumulative GPA) – continue individual intensive intrusive counseling: Interim Grade Reports at 8 weeks, 10 and 12 weeks.
- Student Development and Support Services continue to use a student advisement template which will serve as the key assessment tool for Middle States.
- The English Language Institute (ELI) has expanded its partnerships with community based organizations (CBOs) by offering classes at the Hispanic Resource Center in Mamaroneck. About 100 additional county residents, per year, are being served in their neighborhood with high quality language courses. Through other arrangements with public libraries and other CBOs these classes are available in White Plains, Ossining, Port Chester, Mount Kisco, New Rochelle and Tarrytown.
- The ELI continues partnering with local business to provide contextualized English language training in the workplace, currently for a supermarket chain and a large biotech firm.
- As part of a Gateway Center initiative, and in partnership with the Westchester Hispanic Coalition, the ELI participating in Governor Cuomo’s Office of New Americans (ONA) project which is serving 200 residents with contextualized English language and citizenship services. It

has a large volunteer component which is being addressed primarily through high level ESL learners volunteering to help ONA participants.

- The Center for the Digital Arts summer youth, pre-college program offered full-day 3D Animation and Game Design, Multimedia Storytelling for Teens, and courses for over 200 local Peekskill youth.
- The Center for the Digital Arts promoted student artwork in its robust marketing plan, including a newsletter which is distributed to 47,000 people per year.
- The Center for the Digital Arts is in the midst of its 20th year of operation during the 2013-14 academic year and had a successful 20th Anniversary party and rebranding campaign in honor of its “20 Years of Innovation and Service”. This has been marketed through special exhibitions, events and historical presentations both here in Peekskill and Valhalla.
- Mainstream received funding from the Westchester County Department of Senior Programs and Services to conduct exercise/fitness classes for seniors. Mainstream offered 12 life enrichment courses tailored to meet the needs of the County’s diverse senior populations.
- Mainstream continues to serve as the lead agency for the Northwest Region Livable Community Connection sponsored by the Westchester County Department of Senior Programs and Services.
- Mainstream continues to offer Operation Talent Bank (funded by the Women’s Research and Education Fund) skills training and job search strategies programs for unemployed older adults.
- Small Business Training for Mature Adults, a Mainstream course designed for older adults who want to learn more about starting their own businesses was offered in spring 2014 and will be offered annually.
- The Professional Development Center received approximately \$55,000 from the State University of New York to provide workforce development training to Westchester businesses in the healthcare, biotech and food and beverage sectors.
- New non-credit computer courses offered by the Professional Development Center include Introduction to Prezi; Using Pinterest; Advanced SQL; Social Media for the Masses; Freebies for Windows; Introduction to MS Project; and a certificate program in Social Media for Business that includes classes in What is Social Media, Tools and Techniques for Marketing your Business, and Ethical Issues.
- The Professional Development Center was funded by a Perkins grant to provide training to prepare individuals to achieve the National Word Readiness credential and improve their computer skills.
- The Yonkers Extension Center held two successful Open House events for prospective students with current student leaders working in partnership with the Office of Admissions and other departments in Student Affairs.
- The Yonkers Extension Center continues its partnership with Westchester Family Services and RSVP of Westchester in offering the Work Search program which serves mature job seekers in Westchester County.
- Single Stop offered their services at the Yonkers Extension Center including but not limited to, tax preparation, health care navigation and legal services.

- The Yonkers Extension Center offered staff training in SafeZone (LGBT), Crisis Intervention, and Veteran's Services.
- The Yonkers Extension Center hosted 4-year college visits for transfer advising.
- The Yonkers Extension Center organized common hour events including but not limited to workshops in financial and credit education, career development, and transfer guiding. Students organized a common hour movie event.
- Community Services has successfully partnered with Hilltop Hanover Farms to offer a non-credit certificate program in Sustainable Gardening to educate students on sustainable vegetable production and the program continues to expand.
- Community Services, in conjunction with The Native Plant Center, Go Native University (non-credit certificate program in Sustainable Gardening with Northeast Flora) has expanded significantly and now offers numerous courses which have been approved by ASLA (American Society of Landscape Architects) for Continuing Education credit.
- The Taste of Westchester restaurant program offered through Community Services has grown significantly and features over 35 Westchester restaurants and serves well over 400 students each semester.
- Community Services has partnered with The YMCA Dance Academy in Tarrytown, NY to offer a wide variety of dance programs to the community.
- In partnership with BDI Datalynk, Community Services trained numerous students in Fiber Optics technology. An additional course has also been added to the Fiber Optics training program that provides a certificate in Fiber Optics Specialist Outside Plant.
- In partnership with Coachville (the world's largest life coach training organization), Community Services has created the Center for Coaching Mastery at Westchester Community College and has educated over 100 students.
- In conjunction with the Association of Nutrition and Food Service professionals, Community Services is offering a hybrid Certified Dietary Manager program.
- Community Services partnered with the New York State Library Association to train students to become NYS certified Library Technicians.
- The Gateway Center continues to solidify its presence in the community by creating new partners and deepening existing ones. The Gateway Center continues its role as a partner in NY State's Department Office for New Americans Neighborhood Opportunity Center. In partnership with the Westchester Hispanic Coalition, Gateway will offer English Language instruction, naturalization application assistance and entrepreneurship education to 200 low income immigrants throughout the county.
- The Gateway Center is a partner in a US Department of Education's Investing in Innovations grant that will provide college awareness and readiness activities to English Language Learners in two county school districts.
- The Gateway Center continues to coordinate the Hispanic Heritage Month Committee to organize various campus-wide events to celebrate Hispanic culture. In 2013 the committee hosted a week-long celebration that attracted over 100 students, faculty and community members to activities around film, music and the arts.

- The Center for Financial and Economic Education (CFEE) is dedicated to offering an array of financial education programs for the campus and for residents of Westchester County. With a goal of promoting economic advancement for our community, the CFEE has delivered personal finance workshops for over 2,700 students, faculty, alumni, and members of the public since inception in 2011. This past year we have continued to target programs for our students, including offering an expanded schedule of workshops for students in TRIO, EOP and in our English as a Second Language classes. We initiated a new workshop on managing student loan debt and have also offered it through the Math Department, which incorporates content into its Contemporary Math course.
- In March, 2014 the CFEE hosted the third annual Financial Education Day at the Gateway Center, a free, half-day conference open to the campus community and public at large. We offered 23 workshops on a variety of topics and had over 300 participants, including students, alumni and adults from Westchester County. With strong support from community partners, the event involved over 20 local financial firms, business, and nonprofits.
- During the 2012-2013 academic year 56 individuals at the start-up and growth stage attended workshops offered by G2E. Participants who were looking to start a business took advantage of workshops providing the steps to successfully launch a business and established business attended the Social Media as a Tool for Business Growth workshop and the Academy for Entrepreneurial Excellence.
- G2E will host the 2nd annual “GROW 2.0 Conference for Entrepreneurs and Business Owners” in May 2014. The GROW 2.0 Conference is a partnership with Community Capital New York, Co-Communications, Inc., Durante Rentals, The Business Council of Westchester, Small Business Advisory Alliance and the Westchester County Office of Economic Development. Attendance is anticipated by approximately 300 entrepreneurs and business owners for this comprehensive day-long learning and networking event.
- G2E partnered with the Mount Vernon Extension Center, Mount Vernon Youth Bureau and the Network for Teaching Entrepreneurship (NFTE) to offer the WCC Entrepreneurship Summer Academy to 15 Mount Vernon area high school students, during summer 2013. The College offers this unique six-week program that introduces youth ages 15-17 to basic principles of business planning and management.
- Through a \$25,000 grant from MasterCard, G2E launched a new initiative in May 2014. The “Entrepreneurship for New Americans” is a pilot program that will address unmet needs that are specific to immigrant entrepreneurs and business owners in Westchester County.
- The Office of the County Executive invited G2E to partner to host the “Hispanic Business Forum” in May, 2014.
- G2E partnered with the JCC of Mid Westchester to host the “Driving America: An Entrepreneur’s Story in Business & Philanthropy” in June, 2014.
- The Welcome Center enrolled its 200th student in its free citizenship preparation classes. According to the results of a post-class survey, there was a 96% passage rate among students who had taken their U.S. Citizenship exam.

- The Welcome Center presented a series of College information sessions to English Language Learners enrolled in the College's English Language Institute. These sessions were presented to approximately 150 students, and were designed to familiarize students with the role of the community college and the offerings of Westchester Community College.
- The Division of Continuing Education is working in partnership with the Admissions Department, the EOC, and the Westchester Library System to offer college information sessions for clients of the County Department of Probation. The goal of this program is to assist Probation Department clients to transition into college.
- The Ossining Extension Center offered academic advising for students interested in the non-credit healthcare programs.
- The Ossining Extension Center expanded the successful Phlebotomy program to include an on-site clinical experience.
- The Ossining Extension Center partnered with Senator David Carlucci, Latina U, WCC Financial Aid Office and the Ossining Library to offer a financial aid workshop to the greater Ossining community.
- The Ossining Extension Center sponsored a Health Career fair that included representatives from WCC credit and non-credit programs as well as agencies from the healthcare community such as One Stop.
- The Mount Vernon Academic Support Center was funded by a Perkins Grant to hire a part-time Extension Learning Specialist whose responsibilities include the planning and coordination of skill development programs at all extension centers.
- The Mount Vernon Academic Support Center collaborated with the Academic Affairs and Yonkers Partners in Education to offer a three week summer college preparation academy for 60 high school juniors from three Yonkers High Schools.
- The Mount Vernon Academic Support Center collaborated with the Valhalla campus Academic Support Center and the English Department to create a student success model called TAC: Tutor Assisted Course.
- The Middle States Commission on Higher Education has approved our applications to reclassify eight of our extension locations (Mount Vernon Extension Center, Ossining Extension Center, Center for the Arts in White Plains, The Ursuline School in New Rochelle, Roosevelt High School in Yonkers, Mahopac High School in Mahopac, Lakeland High School in Shrub Oak, and Port Chester Middle School in Port Chester) as additional locations, continuing our reputation of making the college accessible to all students.
- Enrollments at Extension Centers continue to grow. The relocation and expansion of the Mount Vernon Extension Center is expected to result in increased enrollments in part due to larger and increased number of classrooms. Enrollments at the Port Chester Late Start location have tripled in number when compared to the traditional 15 week session that was offered previously. Fasttrack enrollments have increased in Yonkers/Cross County as have overall enrolments in Ossining, Peekskill, Mount Vernon and the school based locations.
- The Extension Task Force brainstormed new initiatives that were proposed and approved for Perkins Funding. An Extension Learning Specialist was at the Mount Vernon Academic Support

Center and is working on expanding tutoring hours at all locations. An Adjunct Support Specialist was hired to work at the school based locations and completed over 50 site visits. She helped improve communication, provided onsite support and technology training, and facilitated adjuncts with hosting on site research tutorials and embedding librarians into their Blackboard shells.

- The Extension Services office successfully expanded the new late start 11 week session in Port Chester Middle School, from 2 days a week to 4 days a week. Enrollments at the location have tripled in number when compared to the traditional 15 week session that was offered previously at this location.
- The Extension Services office continues to send technical assistants to the school-based extensions to assist and train faculty in the use of technology in the classroom.
- The Division of Continuing Education worked in partnership with the Network for Teaching Entrepreneurship (NFTE) to host a county-wide Business Plan Competition. This initiative brings high school competitors from across the county and their teachers to the college; the competition is judged by members of the regional business community.
- The Division of Continuing Education has completed 5 years of partnering with The Successful Learning Center to offer collegiate-based learning opportunities to over 240 developmentally disabled adults.
- The Division of Continuing Education & Workforce Development participated in outreach sessions and provided non-credit workforce course information to individuals who are incarcerated and participating in BOCES educational initiatives at the Westchester County Jail.
- The EOC provided tuition-free academic and vocational training to six hundred sixty two (662) economically and educationally underserved community residents, enabling them to develop competencies and obtain national, state or industry certification in their selected fields so they are more competitive in the labor market. Fifty- three percent (53%) of the students participated in academic programs designed to develop English language skills, prepare for the high school equivalency exam and/or obtain skills required for success in college level courses.
- EOC fully implemented the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) that was funded by the NYS Office of Temporary Disability Assistance to provide case management support and placement services to students who receive food stamps. The ultimate goal of this program is to assist students to secure employment that enables them to become fully self-supporting.
- As an official high school equivalency test site, the Educational Opportunity Center tested 490 community residents to date and expects to test an additional 150 individuals by the end of the academic year to help them obtain their high school equivalency diplomas.
- EOC's ESOL faculty and students hosted it's second International Day on site. During this event, the learning community celebrated the diversity of the EOC student population recognizing it as an asset and celebrating the numerous cultures, races, ethnicities, nationalities, religions and traditions enriching our school.
- EOC continued to provide instruction and comprehensive support to English language learners through a continuum of ESOL offerings which included basic ESOL for beginners, English for the Workplace and English for Business and Health Careers for intermediate and advanced students,

respectively. The programs focused on the acquisition of employment related language and provided students with the skills needed to enter into and succeed in the workplace.

- The EOC collaborated with the Westchester/Putnam One Stop and Westchester Community Opportunity Program to provide free tax preparation services to low income community residents on site. A total of 431 tax returns were prepared.
- EOC collaborated with three organizations, Dress for Success, Career Closet and Career Gear to provide students with work appropriate clothing. A total of 80 students received professional attire to prepare them for the workforce, to date.
- Through EOC's College Connection's Initiative (CCI), low income students who were interested in attending college were provided with the information they needed to make informed decisions about college enrollment. In addition, they received academic preparation in the Center's College Prep Academy, participated in virtual and "live" college visits and tours, and workshops on such topics as goal-setting, note-taking, time management and study skills. They were also given assistance in applying to college and for financial aid.
- A Medical Billing and Coding Industry Advisory Panel was established at the EOC to provide updates on industry trends and changes, and to provide input and advise on curriculum and other matters.
- EOC implemented a Certified Patient Care Technician Program. This program provided opportunities for Certified Nurse Assistants to develop higher level skills and obtain certification to draw blood and administer EKG exams. In addition to creating a health professional with advanced skills, this program assures greater marketability and higher earning potential.
- For the second year, EOC students enrolled in the High School Preparation and College Preparation Academy participated in the campus wide Common Read Project sponsored by the First year Experience Committee by reading "My beloved World" by Sonia Sotomayor. Last year an EOC high school equivalency student won second place in the essay contest.
- In an effort to respond to the needs of community based agencies, EOC administered TABE tests, at no cost, to 138 customers who were referred to the Center for an assessment of their academic skills. EOC also provided community residents with digital literacy training, internet access, and Microsoft Certification Training. More than 231 residents were served in these efforts.
- In preparation for the administration of the Test Assessing Secondary Completion (TASC), the new high school equivalency exam, EOC began the process of integrating Common Core Standards into the high school equivalency curriculum. Educational technology continues to be integrated into core instruction in the High School Equivalency Preparation program at the EOC in order to increase student engagement and reach students with diverse learning styles. Students participated in webinars, video conferences and educational exchanges nationwide. The topics for the video conferences were tied to discipline-specific subjects including US History, Physical Sciences, Earth and Space Sciences, Applied Mathematics and others.
- EOC conducted two very successful fairs to facilitate the enrollment of students into college and/or the placement of students in career oriented jobs; a College and Career Fair in the fall of 2013 and a Career Fair this past spring. A total of 7 colleges, 38 employers, and 274 students and community residents participated in the two events.

- EOC established a partnership with Greyston Foundation to provide Certified Nurse Aide (CNA) and EKG/Phlebotomy Training to eligible students. EOC provided the CNA training while Greyston provided students with uniforms and covered their exam fees. Greyston also arranged for EKG/Phlebotomy training with St. John's Hospital. The students who successfully complete this program will be able to sit for the Patient Care Technician certification exam.
- EOC actively participated on the City of Yonkers' STRIVE Task Force to engage community residents in the process of enhancing educational achievement of students in public schools.
- The Information Technology Department implemented several registration, Human Resource, and Financial system upgrades to PeopleSoft Campus Solutions. These upgrades are required to ensure compliance with financial aid and other federal regulations, as well as maintaining system integrity.
- The Information Technology Department completed the pilot of a new print management system on all student printers. During the pilot, paper consumption was reduced by over 30%.
- The Information Technology Department continues to expand our implementation of server virtualization. This project has reduced the number of required physical servers, which in turn has reduce energy consumption and cooling costs.
- Information Technology, in cooperation with Media Services and Instructional Technology, continued to add new SMART rooms on the Valhalla campus and at various extension centers.
- The Information Technology Department is in the process of implementing SUNY's new DegreeWorks application. This application will be used throughout the entire SUNY system and is designed to enhance the student's ability to graduate and transfer between SUNY institutions.
- The Information Technology started deploying Voice over IP phones on the main campus. This is a multiyear project will improve service quality.

NEW INITIATIVES FOR 2014-2015:

- Two new credit programs have been approved: AS in Environmental Studies and an AS in Environmental Science.
- WCC is scheduled for its 10-year reaccreditation visit by the Middle States Commission on Higher Education, scheduled for spring 2014. The College has launched the process for the research and preparation of the self-study document.
- The Center for the Digital Arts has partnered with ArtsWestchester on a STE(A)M (Science, Technology, Engineering, Art, and Mathematics) exhibition of contemporary art and arts education advocacy and is also producing a program entitled, E.A.T. (Education, Art, Technology) that will be hosted at the ArtsExchange and featuring some Westchester Community College faculty across disciplines. This will be a critical conversation about the value of arts technology integration in education.

- The Center for the Digital Arts will continue the 2nd series of a five year marketing campaign Creating Art in the Digital Age, to build enrollment in our credit and non-credit offerings.
- The Center for the Digital Arts will continue collaborating with local community based organizations to encourage local youth to prepare and attend college.
- Mainstream will continue to be part of the American Association of Community Colleges Plus 50 program and increase educational opportunities designed for adults 50 and older who seek educational opportunities with a focus on workforce training and preparing for new careers.
- The Professional Development Center is working with SUNY on a statewide TAACCCT grant which will enable us to partner with our advanced manufacturing employers and provide non-credit advanced manufacturing training for individuals who wish to enter this field.
- The Professional Development Center, in partnership with Westchester Community College's Foundation, was the recipient of a grant from the Regional Economic Development Council. This grant will enable us to provide workforce development training in the Brewster and Peekskill Opportunity Areas in order to help unemployed individuals obtain employment and underemployed individuals obtain better jobs.
- The Professional Development Center will be providing training for businesses in the hospitality sector as well as in the retail sector with funding from our Westchester/Putnam One Stop Employment Center.
- The Professional Development Center is working closely with the Hudson Valley Economic Development Corporation and other business organizations to support their efforts and expand services to the business community.
- The Professional Development Center is working on a number of initiatives to expand the scope of its training and training-related offerings for the business community.
- The Gateway Center through the English Language Institute will serve as a Neighborhood Opportunity Center for the NY Office for New Americans providing free English language training.
- Gateway to Entrepreneurship will continue to partner with the Mount Vernon Youth Bureau and the Mount Vernon Extension Center to offer the Entrepreneurship summer Academy to high school students.
- The CFEE will continue to expand programs for students by engaging TRIO and EOP students in more online learning programs that involve their direct participation in personal finance activities such as saving and budgeting.
- The CFEE will expand the "Student Loan 101" workshops to involve more financial aid students.
- In connection with Financial Education Day, CFEE will offer a series of personal finance workshops so that residents can continue to take advantage of workshops on various financial topics.
- The Center for Financial and Economic Education (CFEE) will continue to target personal finance training for ESL students by initiating a new series of workshops to teach the fundamentals of budgeting, saving, and managing credit and debt.
- The Welcome Center will expand the length of the College's summer Call Center.
- The Welcome Center will develop new programming in response to the expressed needs of immigrant-serving CBOs.
- Community Services will offer programs on Cyber Bullying and Creative Responses to Bullying.

- The Certified Dietary Manager program offered through Community Services will undergo the 5 year reaccreditation process by the Association of Nutrition and Food Service.
- Community Services will offer a new program, Appraiser Assistant Supervisor, to complement the current Appraisal certificate program and meet the NYS department of State requirements for Appraiser Assistants.
- Community Services will continue to expand leisure and enrichment programs to meet the needs of the community.
- Community Services will continue to expand Go Native University in partnership with the Native Plant Center to offer additional Continuing Education credits for Landscape Architects.
- Community Services will continue to expand leisure and enrichment programs to meet the needs of the community.
- The Ossining Extension Center will partner with Phelps Memorial Hospital and Kendall on Hudson Nursing home as clinical sites to offer the RN Refresher course for registered nurses who want to re-enter the nursing workforce.
- The Ossining Extension Center will offer new programs in Medical Interpreting, Doula training (in partnership with Birth Arts International), an afterschool science academy for middle school students to include classes in Oceanography and Anthropology, and a Wellness series with workshops on Breast Health, Paleo Nutrition, Strengthening the Immune Systems and The Benefits of Natural Hand Soap.
- The Mount Vernon Academic Support Center will host a series of book discussions at the extension centers to support the college-wide First Year Experience initiative.
- The Mount Vernon Academic Support Center will expand the reading/writing tutor offerings to include supplemental support for Foundations of College Reading and Academic Writing courses.
- The Yonkers Activities Council, the first official college club in Yonkers, will initiate a series of common hour events to engage students in their college experience. The club president and officers will participate in student government.
- The Division of Continuing Education will continue its relationship with the County Probation Department to provide information regarding educational pathways for their clients.
- The Division of Continuing Education will continue to work with the Network for Teaching Entrepreneurship to host an annual county-wide competition.
- The Division of Continuing Education will collaborate with The Foundation to identify sustaining funding for entrepreneurship youth activities (Entrepreneurship Summer Academy, etc.)
- A stronger WCC-BOCES partnership for career and technical programs is planned.
- The Division will continue to serve the needs of the developmentally disabled adults by working in partnership with The Successful Learning Center.
- EOC will provide professional development for faculty in the Medical Billing and Coding Program to ensure that students are trained on the most advanced applications used in the industry.
- EOC will provide pre-summer and summer programs for ESOL students to support their advancement into higher level programs in the fall. It will provide training for accelerated HSE students to help them prepare for and take the new TASC® exam.

- EOC will explore and develop new partnerships with employers and/or unions, to increase employment opportunities for students.
- The College Connections Program will be expanded to provide a broader array of services to all EOC students and particularly to those who are college bound.
- EOC will implement a Pre-Vocational Preparation Program to provide students with the knowledge and foundation skills needed to meet the minimum academic requirements for enrollment in a variety of vocational training programs, in order to bridge the enrollment of underprepared students into vocational training programs of their choice.
- EOC will explore and add a new program offering in Allied Health focused on administrative assistance in a medical office environment.
- EOC will continue to modify the curriculum for the High School Equivalency Preparation program to conform to the roll-out of the Test Assessing Secondary Completion (TASC®) and the modifications that will be made to this high school equivalency exam by the New York State Education Department's approved vendor over the next three years.
- EOC will provide opportunities for faculty and staff to participate in professional development to gain knowledge and expertise in the upgraded software that will be deployed in the Medical Billing and Coding program to ensure that students are trained on the most advanced applications used in the industry.
- EOC will transform the Career Center into a College and Career Center to provide greater opportunities for college bound students to access information and resources that are needed for college.
- EOC will create capacity to administer online high school equivalency tests in all computer classes.
- Information Technology will upgrade PeopleSoft Finance 9.0 to PeopleSoft Finance 9.2.
- Information Technology will start a multiyear project to expand wireless services to the green spaces on the Valhalla campus.
- Information Technology will continue to migrate the phone system to Voice over IP to improve service quality.
- The Information Technology Department move into production a new print management system which was successfully piloted on all student printers over the last year.

Enrollment by Division Comparison














Enrollment Status Comparison







US Congressional Districts




WCC Fall 2013 Enrollment
